To meet the definition of a Provincial Boccia Partner of the CCPSA, the following is required from the Provincial Organization:

- Provincially Registered/Incorporated Business
- Finance reports/information are available to members i.e. Audited Statements if applicable
- Proper policies in place to protect the health and safety of members including, but not limited to athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers i.e.:
  - Code of Conduct Policy
  - Abuse, Harassment and Discrimination Policy (could be within Code of Conduct)
  - Screening Policy
  - Rule of Two Policy
  - Travel Policy
- Report annually to CCPSA membership numbers including number of athletes (competitive and recreational), coaches, and officials by gender

Our provincial partners act as the Provincial Sport Organization (PSO) for boccia in their Province. PSOs are responsible for developing boccia in their Province, including:

- Providing a competitive pathway for athlete development from grassroots, recreational programming to the Canadian Boccia Championships
- Athlete recruitment and retention
- Recruiting and training coaches, officials and volunteers
- Conducting provincial championships
- Selecting provincial teams
- Operating within the intent of Canadian Cerebral Palsy Sports Association policies

\*Organizations who do not comply with the above requirements will not be eligible to compete at any CCPSA sanctioned Boccia events, receive any funding/grants from CCPSA or access the CCPSA's Commercial & Liability Insurance.
